


Degree Works: Instructions for Advisors

Degree Works provides a degree evaluation that is personalized for each undergraduate student. A student's Degree Works evaluation is a guide to help create an educational plan and track of all the student's degree requirements for graduation. On the degree evaluation, you will see every requirement for the student's major(s) and minor(s) that must be completed to graduate from UNCG. In addition, you will see which requirements have already been satisfied, denoted by a green check; those requirements that are in progress, denoted by a blue ~; and any requirements that are still outstanding, denoted by an empty red check-box. Students should use their Degree Works degree evaluation every semester when selecting courses for the upcoming term, as well as when making long-term, semester-by-semester graduation plan.

Advisors can access students' individualized *Degree Works* evaluation by following these steps:

- 1. Go to www.uncg.edu and click on the Wicon to access UNCGenie
- 2. Click on Enter Secure Area and enter your user ID and PIN to log in
- 3. Click on the **Faculty Services** tab
- 4. Click on **Advisor Menu**
- 5. Click on Degree Works
- 6. Select the student's evaluation by choosing one of the options below depending on your permissions as an academic advisor at UNCG:
 - If you are an advisor who only has access to view your assigned advisees, select the student's name from the **drop-down box**
 - If you are an advisor who has access to advise all undergraduate students, you can enter the student's ID number in the **Student ID** box
 - If you are an advisor who has access to advise all undergraduate students, you can also or search for a student using **Find**
- 7. **IF** the student's records have been updated since the night before, click on the **O** button to **Refresh** the student's current data and click **Process New** to generate a new evaluation.

Student View Block: This section will provide an overall summary of a student's personal academic information including cumulative GPA, major(s) and minor(s) - if applicable, academic standing, any account holds that may prevent future course registration, and WX count.



Degree Progress Bars: This section will show a pictorial representation of the student's progress towards graduation. The top bar shows the percentage of overall requirements that have been completed and the bottom bar shows the percentage of overall semester hours earned.

Degree Block: This block will show you a simple summary of the student's graduation requirements. Each requirement listed will have more detailed information further down in the degree evaluation.


Insufficient Block: The Insufficient Block shows all courses met with a W, F, or a grade not high enough to fulfill a major requirement.
