

CAPP Degree Evaluation for Students Frequently Asked Questions

My catalog term is Fall 2001 or later, but I began at UNCG prior to Fall 2001. Why can't I use the CAPP degree evaluation?

In Fall 2001, UNCG instituted new General Education Core requirements (GEC). Prior to Fall 2001, UNCG students completed the All University Liberal Education Requirements (AULER) or the College Liberal Education Requirements (CLER). Courses that were completed under the old system do not carry the GEC course designators. For this reason, students with credit prior to Fall 2001 cannot use the CAPP degree evaluation.

I began at UNCG after Fall 2001, but I cannot see my major requirements. When will that information be available?

When I try to generate a new evaluation, I get an "Unable to connect to the system" error. Why am I unable to view my evaluation?

Students with a catalog term prior to Fall 2001 on their record will not be able to generate a new evaluation. The CAPP degree evaluation uses the catalog term to select the requirements. Since the requirements were not in place prior to Fall 2001, the system cannot retrieve degree information on students with an earlier catalog term. To request a degree audit, please contact Student Academic Services.

Will my transfer courses appear on the CAPP degree evaluation??

Yes. Transfer courses are posted to your student record, and they will be reflected on the evaluation. Transfer courses can be identified by the "T" grade and source.

I have transfer credit listed as "General Education Core Transfer Waivers". What does this mean?

Based on the number of transfer hours at the time of entry, certain students are eligible for waivers of Global, Writing Intensive, and Speaking Intensive marker requirements. If you have 60 or more transfer hours, you will have a writing intensive and speaking intensive requirement outside of the major waived. In addition, you will have two global marker requirements waived.

I have a writing intensive GEC transfer waiver listed on my degree evaluation under the "Courses Not Used Elsewhere" area. Why doesn't this waiver fulfill one of my writing intensive requirements?

Students completing a program in the College of Arts & Sciences are asked to complete a total of four writing intensive requirements. If you have 30 or more transfer hours, you may see a writing intensive waiver for the College. If you are not majoring in a program in the College, this waiver does not apply.

Why do I need to see my advisor if my requirements are listed on the CAPP degree evaluation??

The evaluation is a tool to assist students and advisors in the advising process. The real-time, interactive nature of the system reduces the mechanical record keeping tasks and allows advisors more time to interact with students in a meaningful way.
